

No Kill Charleston 2015 a Historic Achievement

Last year was another historic year for Charleston Animal Society, so we wanted to share a few highlights with you:

- We sheltered and saved over 8.000 animals
- We helped an additional 10,000 animals remain with their families and out of shelters
- We introduced the principles of humane education to 12,000 children, laying the groundwork for their growth into humanitarians
- We achieved our third year as a No Kill community, the first in the Southeast
- We attained the American Animal Hospital Association accreditation, becoming the first combined shelter and clinic to earn this distinction in the Southeast

THE NAME THAT ELEVATED ANIMAL CRUELTY TO THE NATIONAL STAGE

It began with that photo of her muzzle wrapped so tightly in electrical tape that it distorted her face and turned her tongue black. Veterinarians worried she may never eat again. But somehow, Caitlyn's spirit showed through the terrified gaze in her eyes – gripping the heart of anyone who could bear to look. Through Facebook, CNN, People Magazine, and other media outlets around the world, Caitlyn, a dog from North Charleston, put a focus on animal cruelty unlike anything seen before. Her survival has become a story of inspiration for millions of people. Charleston Animal Society's Anti-Cruelty team continues to work closely with police and prosecutors in Caitlyn's case and in dozens of others you may not have heard about. Our cruelty investigations in 2015 spanned across Charleston County into almost every community and involved dogs, cats, horses and rabbits. Charleston Animal Society also assisted in cruelty cases around the country, spearheaded by the ASPCA. As for Caitlyn — she is currently living with a loving foster family until the cruelty case against her former owner is completely prosecuted.

In coordination with Charleston County Sheriff's Department, Charleston Animal Society engaged the largest equine rescue in Charleston County **history**, a single case with 11 horses suffering from various levels of neglect.

At its 141st Annual Meeting featuring national political commentator and former White House Press Secretary Dana Perino, Charleston Animal Society announced two major initiatives to evolve out of No Kill Charleston 2015 - No Kill, No Harm, No More, and No Kill South Carolina — the holdest animal rescue initiative ever undertaken in the United States





De Daltorio, Director of Humane Education, is elected to the national **Association of Professional Humane Educators** (APHE) and secures its conference for Charleston in February 2016.

Charleston Animal Society's sheltering facility is renamed **The Laura Pulleyn Center for Animal Care** as an acknowledgment of her approximately \$6 million bequest.

Charleston Animal Society sweeps **City Paper's "Best of" awards** garnering Best Local Cause (3 years in a row), Best Party (Firefighter Calendar Debut), Best Community Activist (Kay Hyman), and Best Do-Gooder (Kay Hyman).

The **2014 Audit** is completed which included no exceptions in the Management Letter.

Charleston Animal Society earns the American Animal Hospital Association (AAHA) accreditation, meeting its approximately 975 standards, becoming only the second nonprofit in the Southeast and the only animal sheltering facility in the Southeast to accomplish this.

Charleston Animal Society hosts **Dogs Playing for Life**, a nationally-acclaimed shelter training & behavior program and implements this unique lifesaving strategy to enhance its training & behavior efforts.

Caitlyn, a dog severely abused, becomes a national sensation and is featured on all major television networks, numerous social media sites and *People* magazine. (see page 3)

SEPTEMBER

Charleston Animal Society partners with The Post and **Courier** to create a kitten play area webcam to stream live via The Post and Courier's website.

At one dollar per year for 25 years, the City of North Charleston formally agrees to lease the adjacent parcel of land (4.5 acres) to Charleston Animal Society for its equine and farm animal rescue efforts, paving the way for Charleston Animal Society to build the state's premier equine and farm animal rescue facilities in 2017.

Calendar

Firefighters rescue people and Charleston Animal Society rescues animals. Combine the two and you get one of the hottest selling firefighter calendars in the world! An initial print run of 12,000 calendars ran out in mid-December, shortly after Dana Perino's coverage on Fox News Channel's *The Five*. More calendars had to be ordered and at last count over 13,000 had been sold! The 2016 Calendar Debut Party was Charleston's hottest party of 2015 with firefighters packing in a sold-out crowd at Memminger Auditorium on October 1. All told, the **2016 calendar project has netted more than \$300,000 for Toby's Fund, Charleston Animal Society's Medical Fund.**

OCTOBER







Charleston Animal Society became the first nonprofit to repeat as **Charleston Magazine's Giving Back Awards Nonprofit of the Year** when folks voted over a 6-month period of time for over 230 Lowcountry nonprofits.

For 3 years in a row, Charleston Animal Society and other key animal and nonprofit organizations have successfully fended off efforts of a special interest group to pass misguided legislation which would prevent nonprofits and government agencies from providing affordable and accessible veterinary care to the public.

In 2015, Charleston Animal Society reached approximately 12,000 kids in its humane education programs, breaking all previous records.

DECEMBER

Charleston Animal Society's anti-cruelty and outreach efforts reach an all-time high resulting in more animal charges and arrests made by law enforcement agencies. The outreach program helped more struggling families keep their pets for life.









Live Release Rate Historic Trend
