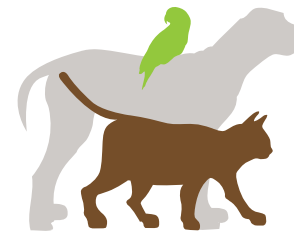

# RESCUES, EVACUATIONS & EMERGENCY ADOPTION CAMPAIGNS. OH MY!

It was all in a year's work at Charleston Animal Society. 2019 began with the rescue of 10 German Shepherds as part of a massive cruelty operation in Georgia. Before we knew it, we were busy providing love, support and expert medical care to six horses that needed rescued. Four were Marsh Tackies, the pride of South Carolina and one of the most endangered horse breeds in the world.

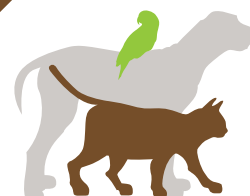
In the Spring, we alerted the public to a statewide outbreak of rabies, the likes of which SC had not experienced in a decade. All the while, the impact of our No Kill South Carolina initiative continued to grow. The Petco Foundation noticed and generously increased its support of the groundbreaking initiative with an additional investment. Along the way, lawmakers passed new animal welfare legislation we had worked for and Pounce Cat Café made their 1,000th adoption! All of Pounce's cats come from Charleston Animal Society.

Then came our response to crises. Before Hurricane Dorian's winds died down on September 4, we had evacuated 332 animals out of harm's way from south Florida through

South Carolina. "We continue to lead the emergency response for animals in South Carolina. The Charleston Animal Society is the key factor in keeping the I-95 corridor flowing for evacuation of shelter animals in disaster prone areas of the southeast," said Charleston Animal Society President & CEO Joe Elmore.

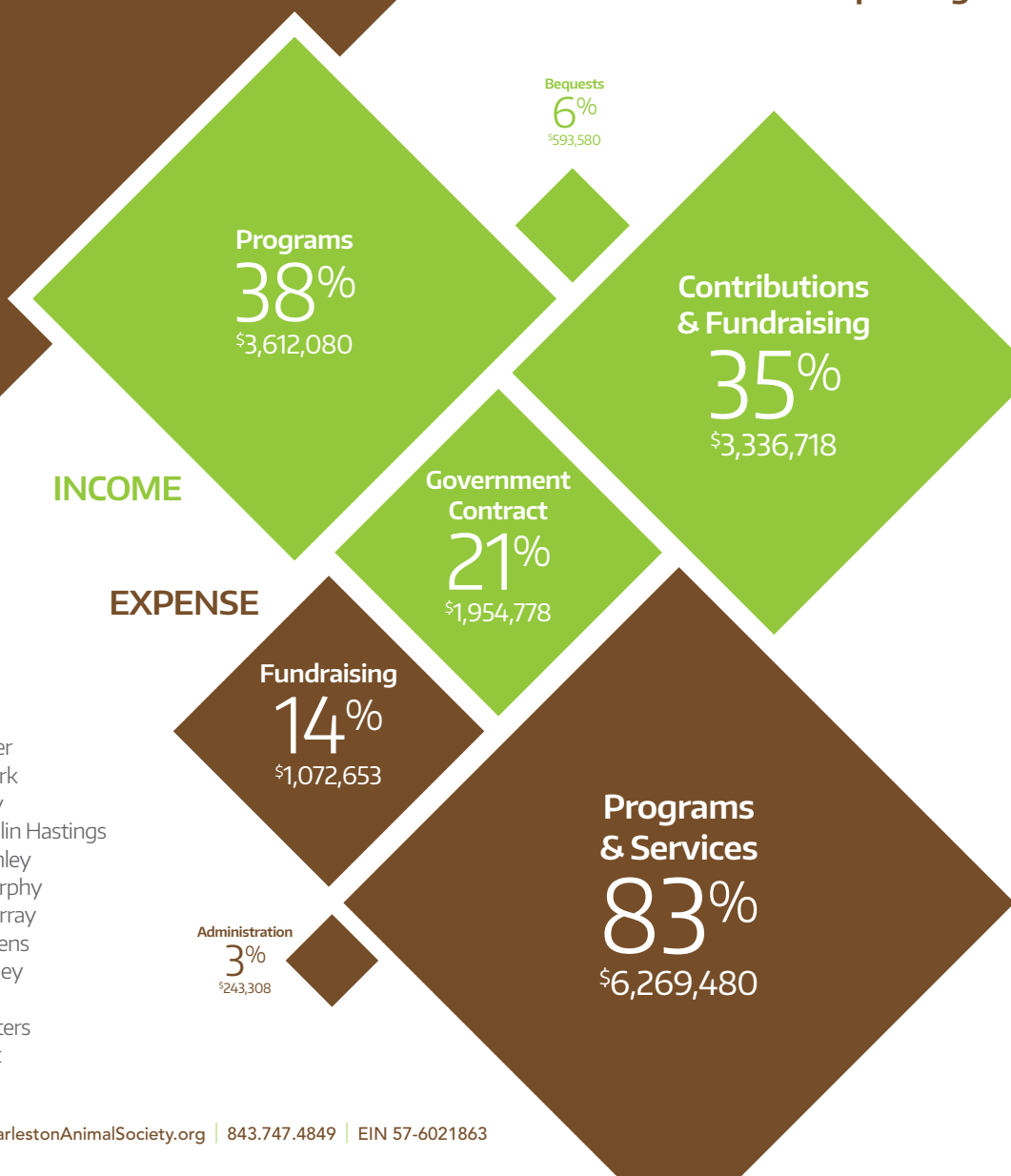
By December, it was "all hands on deck" as shelters across South Carolina found themselves with untenable levels of overcrowding. Hundreds of dogs and cats were threatened when Charleston Animal Society's No Kill South Carolina project launched a statewide holiday emergency adoption campaign. The effort was a success and hundreds of lives were saved.

In addition to its lifesaving efforts to eliminate unnecessary euthanasia, reduce overpopulation and fight cruelty, Charleston Animal Society maintained its status as the top-rated nonprofit in SC (out of over 22,000) for the 7th year in a row.
